Easy Indoor Activities to Beat Winter Boredom

Straw Soccer

With the children make a soccer field out of cardboard, poster board, or a big sheet of paper.

Make a goal at one end: cut in half a fruit container from store, use one from toys or game children already have, small box, etc.

Cotton "soccer" ball. You could also use a small pom pom.

2 or more straws.



Javelin Straws

This breathtaking challenge involves launching paper javelins using only puffs of air.

Set up: Make a javelin by rolling a 6x by 2-inch strip of paper around a pencil. Tape the seam, then fold over and tape one end. Remove pencil. Make five javelins. Mark a shooting line about five feet from a bucket or wastepaper basket. To launch a javelin, slide it over a straw and blow.

Play: Taking turns, players shoot the five javelins, earning a point for each one that lands in the basket. The highest score wins the match.

Whee Ball (Skee ball at home!)

Inspired by the arcade classic Skee-Ball, this game doesn't dispense prize tickets, but it's just as much fun to play--and no tokens required! **Set up:** Find a square box (ours is 14 inches on a side) and cut the top at an angle, as shown. Tape a cardboard ramp to the front edge. Paint the box, if you like. Set the bottom of an egg carton in the rear of the box. **Play:** From a spot several feet away from the box, players take turns rolling 12 Ping-Pong or golf balls up the ramp, trying to land them in the egg carton. After their roll, they count up their score and gather the balls for the next player. Highest score wins the round.

Make your own indoor obstacle course

A fun way for all ages to participate!

In a larger room, set down a couple or more pillows to jump over, a line of paper or tape to walk across, a chair or small table to crawl under, stop to ring a bell or clap blocks together, shoot a crumpled paper ball into a basket... the possibilities are endless! Set up 4 to 5 different "stations" of activities and have the children go round and round. Think about each activity and what it is developing: balance, fine motor skills (manipulating objects with hands and feet for example), large motor skills (crawling, running, jumping, etc.), focus and aim and so on.

Polar Bear, Polar Bear, What Do You Hear? By Bill Martin Jr/Eric Carle


- Name the animals in the story
- Make the sounds each animal makes
- Listen and name sounds you hear in your home
- Act out the movements of the animals
- Copy animal pictures and place on plastic bottles
- Have children use the bottles characters to retell the story



The Snowy Day

By Erza Jack Keats

- Read the story to your child
- Go outside and make footprints in the snow
- Compare the size of your footprints
- Make snow angels together
- Bring snow inside to play in
- Make a snowball and watch it melt

Fun Process Art Experiences

Art for children should be free of adult-imposed constraints and expectations of a particular product. This is called Process Art . Process Art is a way for children to explore their creativity and make choices about what they want to create and how they want to create it! When we give children the choice to dream, remember and think about their world ,we learn what is important to them!

Art is a great tool for self expression!

Adults can enhance the experience by asking children open ended questions about their creations. "Tell me about your picture." "What made you think to use that?"

Painting with Water

All you need is a cup of water, paintbrushes and construction paper. Let children paint away!

Or freeze some colored water into ice cubes and have children use them to paint with. See what art appears as the ice melts!

Snow Painting

You will need spray bottles and food coloring.

Fill the spray bottles with cold water. (Hot and even warm water could melt the snow too much.)

Add a few drops of food coloring to the bottles so that you have one bottle of red, one of blue, and one of yellow water.

Be sure that the bottles have enough coloring in them to make the color show in the snow.

Take your child outside and have fun!

Finger Paint Bags:

You will need heavy-duty zip lock bags, finger-paint, and masking tape for this activity. Place two colors in the zip lock bag then tape up the seam. Place paper under bag to keep it from slipping. Depending on your child's age, have your child predict what new color will be created by mixing the two colors in the bag together.

Let your child explore and describe to you what they are doing.





A Note From the WNY Infant Toddler



With the temperatures hitting the unsafe mark this winter, it can be a challenge to find fresh activities while staying safe and warm inside. It can actually be quite easy to create new experiences with what you already have around the house or classroom. Businesses love giving away free materials, too. So be creative and have fun!

Sticky Snowmen

Create "snowmen" with contact paper and cotton balls (this is fun to put on a low window)

Indoor Obstacle Course

◆ Use pillows, blankets, couch cushion or other soft items for babies and toddlers to crawl over

Touch and Feel Boards

Use various baby/toddler safe materials of different textures and affix to study cardboard

Indoor Igloo

A winter version of a blanket fort (or get access to a large box)

Ice Cube "Paint Brushes"

Create colorful ice cubes with water color or food coloring, Place a craft stick in the center for a handle. Freeze. Provide paper or a table top for painting.

Winter Sensory Bin

 Using a dish pan or sensory bin, hide winter animals and various blue and white objects under cotton balls. Older children can use clothes pins to pick the items out of the cotton balls.
